
Fall 2023 Graduate Enrollment by Degree














Commencement







MGRADUATE SUMMER

FELLOWSHIP

The purpose of the Graduate Summer Research Fellowship is to provide financial support for full-time graduate students to engage in meaningful scholarly activities during a 6-week summer period. The summer research fellowship is intended for students who have no additional means of summer support during the six-week summer period (e.g., grant-funded assistantship; external, paid internships; teaching assignments, etc.). Two hundred and fifty five students received a Graduate Summer Research Fellowship in 2023.

The Graduate School asked all recipients of the 2023 Graduate Research Fellowship to provide a one paragraph description of what they accomplished during their fellowship. Although each student's accomplishments were unique, students reported conducting literature reviews, completing IRB applications, participating in internships, visiting archives, making progress on their thesis or dissertation, traveling to data collection sites, presenting at national conferences, writing journal manuscripts, mentoring undergraduate students, preparing or collecting data, conducting experiments, and submitting publications and presentations. Furthermore, many students commented that the financial support they received was instrumental to their being able to fully immerse themselves in their research in these ways.

ADRIAN PARKER, I **DOCTORAL STUDENT IN EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP**

"During the time of Graduate Summer Fellowship I was able to travel and give a presentation at the Curriculum Studies Summer Collaborative in Savannah, GA. Additionally, I served as a reviewer for the Critical Race Studies in Education Association. Lastly, I was able to pay for classes and complete half of my comprehensive exam in the time given."

MAHMUD KARIM, I **MASTER'S STUDENT IN** MECHANICAL **ENGINEERING**

"This summer, I have written a book chapter on Electrical Discharge Machining (EDM) Technologies in the Aerospace Industry. My research is to reduce machining time by designing different types of graphite electrodes in Electrical Discharge Machining (EDM). I have conducted around 30 experiments which includes making electrodes in Milling machine, taking images on an optical microscope, recording data of weight and dimension of electrode and workpiece before and after machining and finally EDMing on die Sink EDM where the workpiece was Silicon."



BENJAMIN AKANDE, DOCTORAL STUDENT IN BIOLOGY

MADELINE BEDNAR, MASTER'S STUDENT IN BOTANY

"My research is aimed at using zebrafish embryos to elucidate the cellular and molecular mechanisms underpinning cardiovascular development. Before this fellowship, I had constructed a transcriptomic (RNA-seq) library from genetic samples of three-day-old zebrafish embryos. Analysis of the library allowed me to shortlist putative genes accounting for the defect associated with congenital heart defects. With this fellowship, I have been to investigate the putative genes to which outcomes are interesting and ready to be shared with the public. Also, I was able to prepare surgeries on threeday-old zebrafish to isolate their hearts to further understand the molecular pathway that is impeded by the putative genes. To this, hearts samples will be used to construct another RNA-seq library to answer the above questions on molecular pathways. In addition, I collaborated with an undergraduate student, partaking in the NSF REU program, to investigate the effect of stamp sand on zebrafish embryonic development. This project focused on treating zebrafish embryos with varying concentrations of stamp sand to determine the effect on hatching, sensory cell degeneration, and regeneration, and facial development of zebrafish embryos."

"I was able to complete my leaf tissue sample collection trip. I was able to collect about 342 samples for my research. I then was able to extract the DNA from all of the leaf tissue I collected. This DNA will be sequenced so I can learn the genetic diversity of my plant of study (Sweet Gulfcoast Pitcherplant). This rare endemic to Florida is being petitioned by US Fish and Wildlife. My research is providing the genetic analysis for USFWS. I was able to complete a large part of this research during my graduate summer fellowship."



MASTANO N. DZIMBIRI, DOCTORAL STUDENT IN EDUCATION LEADERSHIP

"During my Graduate Summer Research Fellowship, I traveled to Malawi, Africa, where I undertook a study on the geography of school poverty and social justice education. This research delved into the intricate interplay of identity politics in shaping educational policy decisions and their profound consequences on ensuring fair access to educational resources across Malawi. Employing a phenomenological approach, I devoted substantial time to engaging in in-depth interviews with key participants, including both students and teachers, selected from various school districts within my hometown of Mzuzu in northern Malawi. As a culmination of my efforts, I have crafted a comprehensive report and I am planning to channel my findings into a manuscript that I intend to submit for peer review by October 2023."

NSF Graduate Research Fellowship Program

The purpose of the NSF Graduate Research Fellowship Program (GRFP) is to ensure the quality, vitality, and diversity of the scientific and engineering workforce of the United States. GRFP seeks to broaden participation in science and engineering of underrepresented groups, including women, minorities, persons with disabilities, and veterans.

In addition, the Graduate School is committed to preparing our students for applying for the NSF GRFP. In August-October 2023, we offered a GRFP Application Support program to mentor students in preparing and submitting successful applications.





Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

CROSS-CULTURAL MENTORING PROGRAM

The goals of the cross-cultural mentoring program are:

- Creating relationships that foster the sharing of diverse life experiences so that mentoring pairs may learn from one another.
- Assuring that graduate students have a point person, preferably from outside their academic program, that they can go to with questions or concerns.
- Providing support to graduate students who may experience stress or conflict.
- Promoting improvement in teaching skills and performance (if applicable).
- Increasing research skills and productivity (if applicable).

In 2023, 24 graduate students and 27 faculty/staff from five academic divisions participated. This program uses a combination of one-to-one and group mentoring.

BOOK CLUBS

The purpose of the book clubs for this year are to facilitate discussion about leadership with a specific focus on leadership perspectives that represent female-identified perspectives.

- The Spring 2023 book was "Dismantling Institutional Whiteness: Emerging Forms of Leadership in Higher Education" (edited by M. Cristina Alcalde and Mangala Subramaniam). This book is a collection of essays by women of color who are leaders in higher education. The authors reflect on their experiences as leaders and offer insight into navigating the systemic challenges to leading as a woman of color.
 - 34 students participated in online and in-person discussions
 - In addition to book club discussions, the Graduate School partnered with the Office for Institutional Diversity and Inclusion and the Center for Teaching Excellence to host a virtual panel discussion with the editors and some of the chapter authors.
- The book for Fall 2023 was "All We Can Save: Truth, Courage, and Solutions for the Climate Crisis" (edited by Ayana Elizabeth Johnson and Katharine K. Wilkinson). This book is an anthology of 60 contributions that focus on the climate movement and highlight how leadership in this effort is characteristically feminine/feminist by its foundational values of compassion, connection, creativity, and collaboration.
 - 19 students participated in online and in-person discussions

- Nine sessions were offered, with an average of 19 students attending each session
- Students participated remotely and in-person. Topics included;
 Speed Networking (Virtual), Speed Networking (Hybrid), Al and
 Writing, Racial Equity, Writing a Strong Cover Letter, Sustainability,
 The Power of Counter-Narrative, Understanding and Leveraging your
 Clifton, Budgeting and Personal Finance.
- eight students received a "Commitment to Professional Development" recognition for attending six or more sessions in the spring 2023 semester, and 10 students received this recognition for the fall 2023 semester.

GRADUATE STUDENT WELLNESS DAYS

 Three day-long opportunities in Spring 2023 for students to get their CV reviewed, health topics, networking opportunities, chair massages, free lunch, and writing with peers.

MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING

- Arranged for nine graduate directors/staff to attend a daylong session hosted by SCS and the Rec Center in January 2023
- Arranged for two different daylong sessions on Feb. 25, 2023 for graduate students. Thirty-nine graduate students completed the entire training.
- Arranged for a daylong session for graduate students on Oct. 14, 2022.
 Twenty-nine graduate students participated.



Graduate Student Orientation and Welcome Event

There were two orientation and welcome events for new graduate students for Fall 2023.

ONLINE EVENT

The new graduate student orientation was held on Monday, Aug. 21, from 4-6p.m. via Zoom. This goal of the orientation was to help new students learn more about graduate student resources, opportunities at Miami. It was an opportunity to meet the Graduate School staff, hear from the current student panel, receive the duty to report training required for Graduate Assistants (GAs/TAs), and have the opportunity to ask questions.



IN-PERSON EVENT

An optional in-person event was conducted to welcome all graduate students (including returning graduate students) on Aug. 25, 3-4:30p.m. in the Shriver Center Heritage Room. Light refreshments were served, there were opportunities for networking, and information was made available on various graduate student organizations and campus resources.

The Graduate School Emergency Fund meets an essential need for those students who might not otherwise be able to continue their studies due to unexpected financial needs. This may include expenses like those for travel relating to emergencies (such as the death of a family member), replacement of stolen goods, emergency medical or dental expenses not covered by insurance, temporary housing due to displacement by fire or flood, and similar expenses. The Graduate School sees the availability of these funds as central to its mission to reduce barriers for students in completing their hard-earned degrees.

- Total Donations: \$2,482
- Fall 2023 distributions: \$600 to two graduate students facing financial hardship

OTHER GRADUATE AWARDS

MARJORIE POST FARRINGTON AWARD

Three students were selected to receive the Marjorie Post Farrington Award in 2023. This \$1,000 scholarship is awarded to a full-time graduate student based primarily on merit and secondarily on financial need.

GRADUATE STUDENT ACHIEVEMENT AWARD


In 2023, 11 students from eight different programs earned a Graduate Student Achievement (GSA) Award. This award recognizes a significant achievement in a research or creative activity. Achievements in 2023 included peer-reviewed publications, externally funded grants, and earning fellowships.

INTERNATIONAL GRANT-IN-AID (IGIA)

The International Grant-in-Aid (IGIA) award is intended to attract diverse international students to Miami's graduate programs, through a 100% tuition waiver. Sixteen students received the IGIA in 2023.

DISSERTATION SCHOLARSHIPS

Nine students received Dissertation Scholarships in Spring 2023 and eight students received them in Fall 2023. These scholarships provide a stipend and tuition waiver for select students engaging in full-time study related to their dissertation.





GRANT-IN-AID (GIA)

The Grant-in-Aid (GIA) award provides a 100% tuition waiver to high performing students demonstrating financial need. In 2023, 23 graduate students received tuition waivers for 41 semesters.

GRADUATE SCHOOL SCHOLAR ASSISTANTSHIP (GSSA)

The Graduate School Scholar Assistantship (GSSA) is an assistantship used to attract and matriculate highly capable graduate student researchers. Six students received the GSSA in 2023.

DIVERSITY ENHANCEMENT PATHWAY (DEP) AND RONALD E. MCNAIR PROGRAMS

The Diversity Enhancement Pathway (DEP) and McNair Graduate Assistantship Program aim to attract and retain diverse domestic students to Miami with a funded stipend and tuition waiver. In 2022, 60 semester assistantships were awarded to students through these programs.

AANCHTAAKIA GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP

This graduate fellowship through the Myaamia Center is designed for scholars motivated to make positive change in tribal communities and to share their research or interests on Miami University's campus.

GRADUATE STUDENT RESEARCH SUPPORT AWARD

This award funds expenses associated with a student's research for the master's thesis or the doctoral dissertation. The Graduate School funded \$5,200 in requests to 11 students in March 2023, and another \$4,550 in requests to 17 students in November 2023.

WE ALSO RECEIVED FEEDBACK IN 2023 FROM SEVERAL STUDENTS WHO EARNED THESE AWARDS IN 2022. THE IMPACT OF THE AWARDS CAN BE SEEN IN THE FOLLOWING QUOTES:

"I used the funding to care for the animals during the length of the study...This funding is impactful for helping pay for animal care, but it is also a statement of support from the Graduate School. It helps me feel confident in research and publication knowing I have the University's support."

"I used the funding I received from the graduate school to purchase Amazon gift cards which I used as incentives for my research participants. This helped advance my project by generating a bit more interest in completing the survey we used for data collection, and thus helped us achieve a valuable sample size...This funding was impactful because it can be difficult to gain participants, especially when your desired population is very busy and has little time to participate. By offering a small incentive as gratitude for participation we were able to encourage more people to engage in our study. I am very grateful to have had the support from the graduate school to make that small token of appreciation possible."
