You are ready to take advantage of all that Miami offers, so be sure to stay on top of these important deadlines and dates:

Monday, January 15

Confirmation deadline for Early Decision applicants. Go to [MiamiOH.edu/accepted](https://miamiOH.edu/accepted) and click on the Confirm Your Enrollment link or print and submit the Confirm Your Enrollment form on Page 9. After you confirm, you'll be able to access your Miami student email account and Residence Hall and Meal Plan Contract (beginning in late January 2018).

Thursday, February 1

Priority II Deadline to file the FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) at [FAFSA.gov](https://fafsa.gov). Miami's federal school code is 003077.

February-April

Attend a **Make It Miami!** event for accepted students ([MiamiOH.edu/MakeItMiami](https://miamiOH.edu/MakeItMiami)).

Late March

Final notifications of financial aid awards and most scholarships are mailed to eligible students.

Tuesday, May 1

Confirmation deadline for Early Action and Regular Decision applicants. Go to [MiamiOH.edu/accepted](https://miamiOH.edu/accepted) and click on the Confirm Your Enrollment link or submit the Confirm Your Enrollment form on Page 9. After you confirm, you'll be able to access your Miami student email account and Residence Hall and Meal Plan Contract (beginning in late January 2018).

After you confirm enrollment, mark your calendar for upcoming dates.

Late March

Online registration for Summer Orientation opens. Get details at [MiamiOH.edu/orientation](https://miamiOH.edu/orientation).

Wednesday, May 2

Deadline to submit your Residence Hall and Meal Plan Contract. Beginning in late January 2018, students who have confirmed their enrollment will be given access to this online contract. Submit it by the deadline to ensure that your top living-learning community preferences are considered. At [MiamiOH.edu/HOME](https://miamiOH.edu/HOME), you can find out more.

Mid-May

Vaccinations: Miami University policy requires vaccinations for all communicable diseases listed on the Ohio K-12 vaccination schedule. You will receive detailed instructions for submitting this information on your myMiami admission checklist. To review the Ohio K-12 vaccination schedule, refer to the Student Health Center website at [MiamiOH.edu/health](https://miamiOH.edu/health) or call the Student Health Center at 513-529-3000.

Placement tests: Your ACT/SAT math subscores determine your placement in mathematics and statistics courses (as well as other related courses like chemistry). Specific placement details can be found on the Placement Recommendations page ([MiamiOH.edu/cas/academics/departments/mathematics/academics/placement](https://miamiOH.edu/cas/academics/departments/mathematics/academics/placement)). No additional tests are required.

French, German, Latin, Russian, and Spanish placement requires an additional test, which can be found online on the Placement Test and English Portfolio page on the Orientation website ([MiamiOH.edu/orientation](https://miamiOH.edu/orientation)). If you are unsure as to whether or not you will continue taking a foreign language, we strongly advise you to complete this test. All majors within the College of Arts and Science and some majors in the College of Creative Arts and the College of Engineering and Computing have a foreign language requirement. Please take the placement tests as soon as possible after confirming your enrollment at Miami, but no later than mid-May.

May-June

As soon as possible after graduation, have your high school counselor mail your final high school transcript, including date of graduation, to: Miami University, Office of Admission, 301 S. Campus Ave., Oxford, OH 45056-3434. You will not be permitted to begin classes until your final transcript has been received and evaluated.

May-July

If you're buying a new computer before coming to campus, check out Miami's student laptop program (with a special hardware, software, and service package) at [MiamiOH.edu/miaminotebook](https://miamiOH.edu/miaminotebook).

Mid-May to August 1

Miami University requires health care insurance for all full-time Oxford students. To that end, Miami University bills all full-time students for Miami-sponsored Aetna Student Health Insurance. If you do not need this coverage, you must waive this insurance via the student health website at [MiamiOH.edu/health](https://miamiOH.edu/health). For questions, call the Student Health Center at 513-529-3000.

June

Attend a day-and-a-half Summer Orientation session, where you will learn more about Miami and register for classes (for session dates, see [MiamiOH.edu/orientation](https://miamiOH.edu/orientation)). If you are unable to attend orientation in June, you must attend August Orientation just before the start of the fall semester and register for classes at that time.

Mid-July

Your bill for tuition and fees will be sent to your Miami email address (if you're registered for classes).

Late July

Students living in university housing receive their housing assignments by email, which include room details, move-in time, and roommate information.

Early August

Payment is due for tuition and fees and room and board ([MiamiOH.edu/OneStop](https://miamiOH.edu/OneStop)). Miami offers payment plans that allow families to budget each semester's bill over a period of three or four months. With Miami's monthly payment plan options, families incur a nominal enrollment fee; there are no interest charges. Payment plan enrollment does not require a credit check. First-year student move-in day.

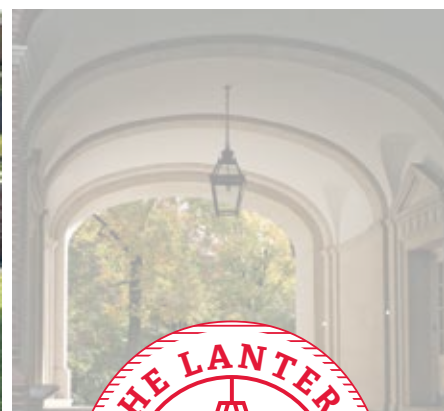
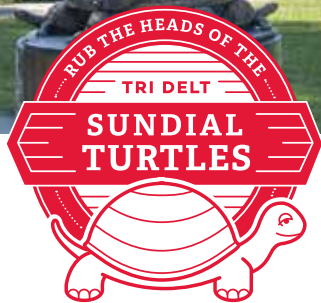

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

How do I select a meal plan and university housing?

Beginning in late January 2018, students who have confirmed their enrollment will be given access to the online Residence Hall and Meal Plan Contract. We encourage you to complete and submit this contract by the published deadline to ensure that your choices are considered when the majority of students are assigned to university housing. Students who don't submit the contract by the deadline will be assigned to university housing where space is available and will be assigned a meal plan. You can find information about both university housing (including living-learning communities) and meal plans at MiamiOH.edu/HOME.

When will I receive information about scholarships and financial aid?

First-year applicants who filed the FAFSA by February 1 will receive their final financial aid packages by late March; some scholarships with special criteria will be awarded at a later date. If you have questions about need-based financial aid or merit-based scholarships, please call the One Stop at 513-529-0001, email OneStop@MiamiOH.edu, or go to MiamiOH.edu/OneStop.

Do you need to see my final transcript and proof of graduation?

Your acceptance to Miami is conditional upon your graduation and the submission of your final high school transcript. It is understood that you must maintain a high level of academic achievement and personal conduct during your senior year. If your final transcript shows that you did not perform to a high academic level during your senior year; if you are suspended, dismissed, or placed on probation by your school; or if you are convicted of a criminal offense other than a minor traffic incident or such charges are pending against you prior to your attendance, **Miami reserves the right to withdraw the offer of admission.**

Please ask your high school counselor to submit to the Office of Admission your final transcript with the date of graduation included as soon as possible after graduation. You cannot attend classes until we have received and evaluated your final transcript.

OFFICE OF PARENT AND FAMILY PROGRAMS

We are excited about your decision to attend Miami! All new students are required to submit a deposit (\$425 if you're living on campus; \$95 if you're commuting), which includes the \$330 Residence Hall and Meal Plan Contract deposit and \$95 admission fee. **The Office of Admission does not refund any portion of the confirmation deposit to students who choose not to attend Miami University.** For students living on campus, the Residence Hall and Meal Plan Contract Deposit of \$330, less any unpaid charges, will be applied retroactively toward your final academic term fees.

Please note, you can also confirm your enrollment online at MiamiOH.edu/accepted. Choose your student type, then click on the Confirm Your Enrollment link to submit your confirmation deposit online.

If you would like to confirm your enrollment via postal mail, please print and complete the form below and mail it and payment to: Office of Admission, Miami University, 301 S. Campus Ave., Oxford, OH 45056-3434.

Deferring admission:

Miami University typically allows students to defer offers of admission for military service, medical reasons, or non-credit earning study abroad programs. We will also consider other requests. Requests for deferrals should be made in writing to: Office of Admission, Miami University, 301 S. Campus Ave., Oxford, OH 45056-3434 or admission@MiamiOH.edu.

PRIVACY RIGHTS

In sources like our online phone directories, Miami University routinely makes available information about our students such as campus and home addresses and phone numbers. This page tells you how to review your privacy rights and keep your personal information confidential.

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended, commonly known as FERPA, provides students with a right of access to their education records, permits students to challenge the accuracy of the records and prohibits the non-consensual release of such information except in limited circumstances. Directory information may be released to anyone without the student's consent; Miami University has designated the following as directory information:

1. name, campus address, telephone listing, and campus email address;
2. place and date of birth;
3. major field(s) of study, including the college, division, department or program in which the student is enrolled;
4. enrollment status (undergraduate or graduate, full-time or part-time);
5. dates of attendance;
6. degrees, scholarships, honors, and awards, including President's List, Dean's List, honorary organizations and grade point average of students selected;
7. most recent educational institution attended;
8. photographic, video, or electronic images taken and maintained by the University;
9. participation in officially recognized student organizations, activities, and sports;
10. weight and height of members of athletic teams.

A student has the right to refuse to permit the designation of any or all of the categories of directory information. Any student wishing to exercise this right must inform the Office of the University Registrar in writing on or before July 15 of the categories of personally identifiable information that are not to be designated as directory information with respect to that student.

CLERY ACT AND MANDATORY REPORTING

Mandated reporting requirements

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act is the landmark federal law, originally known as the Campus Security Act, that requires colleges and universities across the United States to disclose information about crime on and around their campuses.

All employees who become aware of any alleged violation under MUPIM 3.6 or the Title IX protocols, including retaliation are required to report it to the Director of OEEO/Title IX Coordinator (for all reports of sexual harassment/misconduct involving employees and for other forms of protected class harassment and discrimination) or one of the Deputy Title IX Coordinators (for all reports of sexual harassment/misconduct involving students).

Graduate Assistants (GAs), Residential Assistants (RAs), Orientation Leaders (SOULS), and student managers in Housing, Dining, Recreation and Business Services (HDRBS) are also required to report.

Crimes to be reported include:

- Criminal homicide (murder and non-negligent manslaughter & negligent manslaughter)
- Sex offenses (rape, fondling, incest, and statutory rape)
- Robbery
- Aggravated assault
- Burglary
- Motor vehicle theft
- Arson
- Domestic violence
- Dating violence
- Stalking
- All hate crimes involving personal injury, theft, intimidation and destruction, damage, or vandalism of property
- Arrest & referrals for liquor, drug, and weapons law violations

Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 is a federal law prohibiting discrimination on the basis of sex in higher education. Sex discrimination includes sexual harassment and sexual violence.

This includes sexual misconduct, sexual violence, and sexual coercion of students. Ms. Getson also serves as the coordinator for matters relating to student domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.
