Miami University and the State of Ohio have enjoyed a successful partnership for 209 years.

Miami's vision is to provide the best undergraduate experience in the nation, enhanced by superior, select graduate programs. Experiential learning prepares students to lead in companies and communities.

We are a residential university with faculty who are dedicated to learning and discovery. On the Oxford campus, Miami offers bachelor's degrees in 122 areas of study. Graduate students choose from more than 60 master's degree and 12 doctoral degree programs. Seventeen bachelor's degrees and 13 associate degrees are offered at Miami's regional locations.

Our relationships with local and distant communities include more than 220,000 passionate and successful alumni involved around the world – nearly half of whom live in Ohio.

Affordability at Miami is enhanced because

- Students can carry a double major or minor (nearly 50% do).
- Students pay no extra tuition beyond 12 credit hours per semester.
- More than 60% of academic programs offer pathways for completion in three years.

Lean initiative to reduce costs
and maximize efficiency,
we have gained more than

in additional or new revenues or cost reductions while reinvesting in critical strategic priorities and building academic quality. Miami continues to **invest in building and infrastructure improvements** that reduce
our energy consumption and
carbon footprint.

Recent projects include:

- Western Geothermal Plant expansion
- Ongoing renovations of residence halls following LEED Silver guidelines
- Focused LED lighting replacements
- Aggressive retro-commissioning of existing spaces.

Miami's energy footprint has been reduced 36% and our carbon footprint has been reduced 33% compared to a baseline fiscal year of 2008.

Cost of Degree in four years for an Ohio Resident

Ohio students who apply to Miami also often apply to other high-caliber private and public universities. With Miami's high four-year graduation rate, Ohio students attending Miami can save anywhere from \$53,664 to \$143,996 on average four-year tuition costs, based on today's out-of-state institutions' rates.

Miami's Positive Impact in Ohio

Miami is the largest employer in Butler County.

The overall impact of Miami University on the local business community during 2016-2017 amounted to **\$2.3 billion** in added income, combining the impacts of operations spending, research spending, construction spending and student, visitor and alumni spending — *more than 28 times greater than the state's* **\$81.8 million investment in the university.**

Also, the \$2.3 billion in combined spending is estimated to support 31,473 Ohio jobs.

Facts at-a-glance

Affiliation: Miami is an Ohio public university.

History: Founded in 1809, Miami's name reflects the history of the Native American tribe who once lived in the Miami Valley region of Ohio. Miami maintains strong ties with the Miami Tribe, now located in Oklahoma, and with the Myaamia Center, a cultural and research center, in Oxford.

Location: Oxford, Ohio (35 miles northwest of Cincinnati). Miami's Oxford campus encompasses 2,138 acres and includes 188 buildings.

Enrollment: (fall 2017) 17,147 undergraduates and 2,553 graduate students in Oxford. Regional campuses in Hamilton, Middletown, and West Chester enroll 5,000 students combined. About 200 students per year leave Oxford to study at Miami's **Luxembourg campus** for a semester or year.

Cost: First-time in-state Oxford students enrolling in fall 2018 pay \$15,378 tuition and general fees, an amount frozen for four years by the Miami Tuition Promise. Since 2016, Miami's Tuition Promise freezes a cohort's tuition and fees for four years for in-state and out-of-state students (classes entering in 2016 and 2017 pay a different amount, also frozen).

New out-of-state students in fall 2018 pay \$34,895 in tuition and fees, frozen for four years.

Room and board cost for incoming students in 2018 is \$13,860 (weighted average, options vary) and will not rise within students' four-year experience.

Tuition at the regional campuses is among the **lowest regional** campus tuitions in the state.
