First room expected to open in October.

OXFORD — As summer begins to wind down and the first new Miami University students begin to trickle into Oxford in preparation for the 2013 fall semester, several

construction projects around campus are wrapping up as well.

Since the 1960s, the student population of Miami University has more than doubled, according to the college's Physical Facilities Department website. Ranging from 6,000 in the 1960s to over 16,000 in 2013, the outdated Shriver Center is slated to be upstaged by the new Armstrong Student Center.

Primarily to provide meeting space for the university's more than 350 student organizations, the new student center – in planning since 2008

 will open its first room in October: The Shade Family Room. The Center is expected to officially open in January.

The new student center will feature a 500-seat theatre and a pavilion with banquet-style seating for 600 or lecture-style seating for 900. It will also include a large common area and a specialized Center for Student Engagement and Leadership or "SEAL," and a 24-hour sit-down dining location serving breakfast, lunch and dinner every day of the week.

cuisine such as "Latin Flavors" and "Mongolian Asian Noodles."


