Call them the Queen City screen gems. When Hollywood directors shoot in Greater Cincinnati and Northern Kentucky, they've found the obvious – and obscure – settings for their feature films.

The Roebling Suspension Bridge often makes a scene. Over-the-Rhine is the most popular destination because it can be transformed into 1919 (“Eight Men Out”), or New York in 1942 (“The Public Eye”), or 1956 (“A Rage in Harlem”), or the present day (“Traffic”).

Production designers also like the looks of Lebanon, Melbourne and Oxford.

By the end of March, Cincinnati streets will provide an early 1950s New York City backdrop for “Carol,” starring Cate Blanchett, Rooney Mara, Kyle Chandler and Sarah Paulson.
