We provide this Report Card to both current and prospective Miami students and families, and to our local, regional, and state leaders — highlighting key quality measures and a selection of high-impact programs that prepare graduates to lead, serve, and contribute meaningfully to communities.

## AFFORDABLE QUALITY

For each incoming class, the **Miami Tuition Promise** freezes tuition, room and board, and special purpose and course fees for four years, providing cost certainty for students and families. Cost stability ensures that a student's renewable scholarships and financial aid dollars retain their value during the four-year Miami experience.

The Miami Access Fellows program ensures that academically competitive students from Ohio families with incomes of \$35,000 or less pay no tuition or fees.

Miami University has successfully **maintained the average tuition paid for nearly 20 years** by increasing scholarship giving and administrative efficiency to create more institutional scholarships.

## MIAMI STUDENTS RECEIVE VALUE BY STAYING IN OHIO

Ohio students who apply to Miami often also apply to high-caliber private and public universities in other states. These students can save significantly on four years of tuition and fees by staying in Ohio and attending Miami, which is No. 26 among national public universities for four-year graduation rate, and is top two in Ohio.

## OPTIMIZES CAREER POTENTIAL

According to Payscale.com, Miami graduates have an early-career alumni median salary (0-5 years) of \$71,400.

Miami empowers its undergraduate and graduate students by connecting them with employers and alumni to explore career paths and build professional networks that support long-term success. Alumni who graduated from Miami in 2024 had an overall success rate of 98.2%, according to the First Destinations overview for that year, outpacing the national rate of 86%. The overall success rate is the percentage of alumni who are employed, engaged in military service, volunteering, or continuing their education.

## Graduating Ohio's Future Leaders

Miami's four-year graduation rate for the most recently completed cohort was 70%, the second highest among Ohio's public universities. In comparison, the four-year graduation rate for the most recently available national cohort (fall 2017) is 49%. Miami's six-year graduation rate for the fall 2019 cohort was 80%.

## Fisher Innovation College@Elm

Driving entrepreneurship and economic growth in rural Southwest Ohio, the workforce development incubator is a catalytic force for Oxford, Butler County, and the surrounding region. Anchored by the brainpower of 20,000 Miami undergraduates, Miami's No. 8 among U.S. publics ranked Entrepreneurship program, College@Elm has already generated 67 new jobs and \$3.3 million in payroll.

## Ohio Hometown Talent Initiative

The Ohio Hometown Talent Initiative cultivates emerging professionals and demonstrates how rural communities can shape the state's economic future. Currently in its second year, the initiative aims to reinvest and strengthen the social and economic fabric of these communities, fostering local leadership and economic growth. Miami has partnered with the Butler County Board of Commissioners and the Darke County Board of Commissioners to give first- and second-year students the opportunity to explore internships in various hometown communities with local employers.

## ADDS VALUE ON DAY ONE OF EMPLOYMENT

Through an employer-driven approach centered on developing the talent Ohio and the workforce need, partnerships with businesses, and a focus on in-demand careers, Miami University has created pipelines to strengthen Ohio's workforce and economy. Miami is focused on creating degree programs that meet the state's workforce needs. Miami launched Ohio's first four-year Robotics Engineering program, expanded the Nursing program, and created innovative and interdisciplinary facilities such as the new Cleveland Clinic Health Sciences and Wellness Facility and McVey Data Science Building in Oxford.

Miami graduates are well prepared to meet Ohio's evolving workforce needs across key sectors, including advanced air mobility, manufacturing, robotics engineering, healthcare, and cybersecurity.

## Quantum Computing

The Ohio Institute for Quantum Computing Research, Talent, and Commercialization positions Ohio as a global epicenter for quantum computing innovation where talent, industry, and research converge to drive economic growth. Formed through a groundbreaking partnership between Cleveland Clinic and Miami University, the institute aligns industry needs with hands-on training to produce professionals ready to add value on day one.

Powered by the world's most advanced quantum computer dedicated to medical research and housed at Cleveland Clinic, Ohio holds a unique competitive advantage in attracting top talent, investment, and companies. Backed by \$7 million from the State of Ohio, Miami and Cleveland Clinic launched Ohio's first bachelor's degree in Quantum Computing, ensuring Ohio leads in developing the workforce and solutions for this rapidly emerging global market. The Ohio Institute for Quantum Computing also expands research experiences and specialized learning opportunities that connect quantum computing with healthcare applications, commercialization, and workforce development, benefiting Ohio and beyond.

## ONE OF THE NATION'S TOP BUSINESS SCHOOLS

Miami University's Farmer School of Business is considered one of the top public business schools in the United States. In the recently released rankings from Poets & Quants, the Farmer School was ranked No. 14 among public business schools for undergrads, and the top in Ohio. Last summer, the publication listed the Farmer School as one of the 10 Undergraduate Business Programs to Watch. Miami rose four spots overall from its previous ranking, and was also ranked No. 4 among publics for career outcomes and No. 7 among publics for student experience.





## Expanding Ohio's Economy

Miami contributed \$3.8 billion in added income to Ohio's economy in 2021–2022, according to the most recent comprehensive study of public university economic impact in the state. This activity supported 52,401 jobs across Ohio, including \$2.3 billion in added income and 29,632 jobs attributable to Miami alumni.

## Advanced Manufacturing Hub (AM Hub)

The Advanced Manufacturing Workforce and Innovation Hub at Miami University serves as the foundation for workforce readiness and advanced manufacturing, addressing many of the most pressing needs of Southwest Ohio.

The AM Hub is a collaboration between Miami University, Butler Tech Career Technical Center, and OhioMeansJobs Butler County. It integrates a workforce development center, research center, and commercialization center to directly address Ohio industry's advanced manufacturing workforce needs. The workforce development center opened in February 2026 in Hamilton.

The industry-driven facility brings together workforce support and opportunities, next-generation labs and classrooms, a robotics arena, and the Makino Subtractive Lab. Learners can begin their studies at Butler Tech and progress to the associate and bachelor's degree programs in Engineering Technology at Miami Regionals or to the undergraduate and graduate programs in the College of Engineering and Computing in Oxford. Degree earners will find well-paying, in-demand manufacturing careers in Ohio.

## Healthcare Innovations

Additional partnerships with Northeast Ohio Medical University (NEOMED) and The Christ Hospital Health Network in Southwest Ohio are creating new pathways for students to pursue medical careers in the state. For example, an early assurance program will provide Miami undergraduates a streamlined pathway to NEOMED's College of Medicine. Miami and NEOMED have also launched the Miami Northeast Ohio Nursing Program, an innovative, 24-month curriculum designed to strengthen the nursing pipeline for all Northeast Ohio healthcare partners.



# Facts at A GLANCE

**Affiliation:** Miami is an Ohio public university.

**History:** Miami University was founded in 1809. Its name reflects the history of the Native American tribe that once inhabited the Miami Valley region of Ohio. Miami maintains strong ties with the Miami Tribe, now located in Oklahoma, and with the Myaamia Center, a cultural and research center on the Oxford campus.

**Location:** Miami is in Oxford, Ohio, between Dayton and Cincinnati in Southwest Ohio. In addition to the Oxford campus in Ohio, Miami operates regional campuses in Hamilton and Middletown, and the Voice of America Learning Center in West Chester.

**Enrollment:** In fall 2025, Miami enrolled 16,240 undergraduates and more than 2,000 graduate students in Oxford. Regional campuses in Hamilton, Middletown, and West Chester enroll more than 3,850 students combined. This totals over 22,000 students enrolled at Miami in the 2025-2026 academic year.
